## CBC news bureau for Salmon Arm

BC has announced installation of six news bureaus in BC, including one in Salmon Arm.

The Interior East bureau in Salmon Arm will work closely with existing teams in Kelowna and Kamloops and cover municipalities in the region such as Armstrong, Vernon, Sicamous, Revelstoke and Enderby.

The other BC bureaus will cover Fraser Valley; North Island out of Nanaimo; Peace Region out of Fort St. John; Sea to Sky out of Squamish; and Penticton, serving the southern Okanagan.

Jobs will be posted in the coming weeks on the CBC job board and involve one to two reporters in each bureau.

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## **OCP** update

n 85-page document was released after past of year of study and gathering public input for the city's Official Community plan.

It was presented at Monday's Development and Planning meeting and can be read at salmonarm.ca as part of the agenda package. The current OCP was adopted in 2011. The summary document (cover on right) outlines what was heard during first two phases of the




project and highlights a wide range of interests and perspectives from across Salmon Arm.

According to summary, key takeaways include:

Connectivity: active transportation, public transit, easy access to services and amenities

- Balanced growth: Well-maintained infrastructure and facilities that support growth and change; protected and enhanced natural areas, green spaces, trees, agri land
- Sustainability: reduced greenhouse emissions; improved climate resilience; access to healthy, local food; dierse food growing opportunities, improved water quality.
- Safety: celebration of diversity and sense of belonging; access to low barrier social, cultural and wellness services and supports; improved emergency preparedness.
- **Affordability:** for housing, transportation and recreation; low unemployment.
- Community vibrancy: downtown core, small business; arts and cultural spaces and celebrations; age-friendly public spaces and recreational opportunities. ■

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## 'Friends' come to town

st. Andrew Hodges released an "RCMP Crime Chronicles" on incidents around New Year's, and it is another classic.

In one report that gets going at 4:30 am, Jan. 2, the officer and 'budding screenplay writer' uses anonymous names for a group of "friends" - Phoebe, Ross, Rachel, Gunther, Chandler and Monica. Now where did I hear those names before?

A convoluted account unravels in which a Phoebe claimed she had permission to drive her friend Rachel's Audi Q5 from Mission to visit their friend, Ross, in Salmon Arm.

On enquiry to Mission, it appeared there was some confusion concerning permission or whether the car was stolen and



even who the car was registed to - Rachel or a Gunther.

Police eventually determined that Monica had permission to drive the vehicle, "though Phoebe was doing it wrong, so she left in the Audi Q5 without Phoebe who was suspected of stealing from Ross. Phoebe was left at a local coffee shop to find her own way back to Mission, or maybe do some couch surfing."

Looking back to 1980, Duncan helped get things going for the transformation of Salmon Arm's waterfront. He took a series of photos of the big mess across the tracks and then gave a presentation to council. A year later, council commissioned a study,

Vic Bates began acquiring waterfront property and the Chamber of Commerce formed a committee to push for OCP and conservation prop-

erty purchases via the newly formed SABNES. Besides council and tourism, Duncan was active in Rotary and Hospital Foundation It's nice to see him now making life better for senior mobility, at least in places where there's loads of snow on the sidewalks.

Oh, and to go back even further in time. Duncan was once a movie set caterer, including serving the cast and crew of "Lawrence of Arabia". Quite the life indeed! ■

## Rise of the Machines

am writing this on a laptop computer that is eight years old. It was working well until about three months ago when it started to send me unprompted messages about how I should deal with the upcoming lack of support for the operating system. From that day on, it has



got slower and increasingly eccentric. Obviously, a coincidence as no global company would deliberately sabotage a customer.

A Large household appliance manufacturer has been accused of what is called planned obsolescence by making parts unavailable before the warranty period expires and a company that makes big green tractors has been found guilty in US courts of deliberately preventing repairs by third parties by using exclusive computer codes.

While this sounds scandalous just think of cars. Mine is older than the computer and it still requires the use of a special scanner to read and correct its foibles. Mine is old enough that they had some conscience left and various bits can be reset using odd procedures. The Body Control Module (that looks after lights, locks, heater and radio) can be synchronised by a sequence including turning the key, waiting ten minutes and turning the key again and then waiting ten seconds. You do this three times without opening a door or operating any other device. Once completed it magically knows all the things connected to it - except the radio which is locked off, and, you guessed it, needs a special scanner to unlock! Take a book, a coffee and dress warm!

This is an old car. I can only presume new ones undergo the equivalent of an MRI just to change the sparkplugs. I know that some manufacturers are so fed up with people fixing their own cars and the loss of revenue and their franchises that they make the transmission a sealed unit.

Another oddity in the auto world is the number recalls. They should have made the thing correctly in the first place, but I wonder if there is anybone who has had a recalled vehicle in the shop that has not said "and while you're at it, can you...." And thereby kept the franchise going. This does presume the manufacturers to not be completely incompetent, but one wonders when an ancillary engine part on a best selling pick-up requires the whole vehicle to be raised, the body raised from the frame and the engine raised from its mounting just to get a bolt to clear the chassis.

Mechanicals aside, I shudder to think how user unfriendly electric vehicles will be. They are already aware of where they are. Will they report back with pictures if some unsanctioned person attempts a repair? What would be the penalty? Would all my machines go wrong?

There are two solutions for my computer. One is to replace it and the other is to fix it and upgrade to the new operating system. While I like the second from an ethical standpoint, realistically, I will probably buy another and hope I learn to use it before it to becomes obsolete.

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

ands up if you want Trump to take over Canada! With threats of sky-high tariffs and 'jokes' about Canada becoming the 51st state, most Canadians are not at all amused.



dA rich and morally bankrupt President-elect is now back in the White House. Acknowledging our own colonial history, which we must reconcile, I tell myself that Canada is not Trump's for the taking.

However, centuries of living in a place does not protect you from those who want to take it over. This is how the Palestinians felt in 1948 at the creation of the State of Israel.

When someone says, Israel has a right to claim all the land and Palestinians should just disperse to neighbouring Arab countries, just think of how you would feel if Trump rationalized taking over our country, perhaps by saying we never had a right to it in the first place, and now 'his might is right.'

After the atrocities of the Holocaust in World War 2, it was clear the world had failed to protect the Jewish people. Out of a sense of guilt and moral failure, the UN decided that Jewish people needed a safe place and since there was an ancient connection to the land of Palestine, they could have a portion of that - so long as they did not interfere with the Palestinians already living there.

Following the war, land ownership in Israel-Palestine was roughly six per cent Jewish and 94 per cent Palestinian. The UN Partition Plan of 1947 allocated 53 per cent to a Jewish-majority state, and 47 per cent to a Palestinian-majority state. Western countries voted in support of the Plan, while most Asian and African countries voted against it. Palestinians were never given a vote at the UN. Their land was simply taken. In the armed conflict of 1948, Israel seized vast amounts of land intended for the Palestinian-majority state. In 1967, Israel invaded the West Bank and Gaza, and has militarily controlled these territories ever since, despite the UN resolution which states they must relinquish this control.

Now, we have a genocide playing out in Gaza, and extensive human rights abuses happening in the West Bank. Western silence and justification does not serve the truth and will not bring security to anyone.

When we are feeling anxious about the future of our own country and who might have designs on it, let's use those feelings to cultivate empathy for others who have been historically dispossessed, including Palestinians. Let us insist that every nation be held to the same standard of International Law, demand a UN led ceasefire and an end to the genocide in Gaza.

## INSURANCE WOES IN A WARMING CLIMATE

eeing the images of devasting wildfires in Los Angeles elicits still-fresh memories of the BC wildfire disasters in 2023. That summer in the Okanagan and Shuswap, wildfires burned 2.84 million acres, forced tens of thousands of people to evacuate, and destroyed hundreds of homes and other structures. It is triggering for many in the Shuswap.

That year, the BC wildfire season resulted in over \$720 million in insured losses, putting it at the top of all other 2023 extreme events and in the top ten ever in Canada.

Now, the California wildfires once again highlight the increasing risks not just for people but also for insurance companies covering losses associated with climate-fueled catastrophes.

Whether it's flooding, hurricanes, tornadoes or wildfire, the insurance industry in the US has been running catastrophe models which are now being informed by climate change data. These companies do not subscribe to conspiracy theories and have no hidden agenda. They are simply using scientific facts to help them make decisions so that their businesses remain viable.

The models they are using predict increasing liability, particularly in areas prone to extreme weather events. The

higher costs of building and home repairs are also intensifying those losses.

Unsurprisingly, the growing risk borne by insurers is now impacting those purchasing insurance. S&P Global reports that the average home insurance premiums rose a stunning 43 per cent in Florida and similarly in California between January 2018 and December 2023.

Those increases were much higher than the rate of inflation over the same period. In response to these increasing liabilities, some large insurance companies in several US states have reduced or completely ended coverage in those regions seeing more frequent, widespread and intense natural disasters associated with climate change.

The California Department of Insurance states that between 2020 and 2022, insurance companies declined to renew 2.8 million home policies in California, including 531,000 in LA County.

In Canada the situation is similar, with a rapidly warming climate impacting property insurance in this country. A Canadian insurance technology company recently conducted an analysis of insurable losses over the last 40 years using Statistics Canada data.

They compared the 10-year average of annual disaster-related insurable losses against the prior 30-year average, adjusted

for inflation. They found the annual average insurable losses in Canada over the last decade increased by a whopping 379 per cent, when compared to the prior 30-year average. Data from the Insurance Bureau of Canada supports that assessment, reporting that in 2024, Canada suffered insured losses in excess of \$7 billion – a 406 per cent rise from the 20-year average.

With premiums trending upward locally, the industry has been shifting liabilities onto policyholders by upping premiums and deductibles, limiting coverage and/or requiring certain proactive measures to mitigate various types of damages.

Populations here and around the world are worried about inflation, yet we appear to be sleep-walking into the greatest inflationary mechanism we have ever faced – climate change. Insurance costs are very likely the "canary in the coal mine", providing us insight into how costs are going to increase not just for insurance, but for every single item impacted by climate chaos.

We are in a new era of climate extremes that has a myriad of dire consequences for citizens, and the sooner we address the root problem – the factors fueling the climate crisis – the better. Meanwhile, as the planet continues to warm, heed the advice from emergency and fire experts in Los Angeles – "prepare for the unprecedented".

## Call for common sense on parking along Harbourfront Dr.

To Salmon Arm council and operations managers:

Te took a walk on the Raven Trail to take advantage of the sunshine in the late morning and enjoy what is one of this towns treasures.

We realized many others had the same idea. The small parking lot at the trailhead was full, so we parked on Harbourfront Drive, along with many other vehicles. There was no snow in sight, no plowing scheduled,

Established in 1982, Shuswap

Children's Association is a non-profit child development centre offers a variety of services focussed on supporting children, youth and families.

Originally known as Shuswap Exceptional Children's Association, it was formed by a group of parents who found they were unable to access services for their children.

They were joined by community professionals, service providers and others who shared the goals of the parents. The Association's first program was a block-funded preschool assisting 18 children with support needs, along with 18 non-support needs children. The children were supported by three trained staff members and an annual operating budget of under \$50,000.

The program started in 1986 with financial support from the Variety Club, and when Ladybug Preschool opened its doors at the former Salmon Arm Elementary.

In 2004, we changed our

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

Cst. Andrew Hodges has released an RCMP Crime Chronicles for incidents around New Year's, and it's another classic. In this report he uses anonymous names for a group of "friends" - Phoebe, Rachel, Ross, Monica and Chandler. Now where did I hear those names before?.

woman reported her friend's vehicle was stolen from the 100 block of Hwy 1 at 4:30 am, Jan. 2. Police attended and met with 37-year-old Phoebe who explained she had permission to drive her friend Rachel's Audi Q5 from Mission up to Salmon Arm, with their friend Monica to visit Ross and see how they were doin' in Salmon Arm.

Police observed a white Hyundai Sonata westbound on Lakeshore Dr with no rear tail lights illuminated. The Sonata appeared to suddenly turn into a nearby closed fast food restaurant and the driver exited the vehicle immediately upon stopping.

Police conducted a traffic stop, and spoke with the 48-year-old male driver who smelled of alcohol. Police also observed and open box of beer cans in the rear seat. The driver admitted to consuming one beer one hour earlier.

A breath demand was conducted and the driver blew a fail. The driver declined his right to a second test after pleading with the officer they had the wrong guy and that he just driven a friend to the hospital. Police advised him if a sober driver was not available, that they should be calling an ambulance if someone needed immediate transport to the hospital.

Police received a later report that the driver was observed obviously drunk inside a local restaurant, was accosting customers and asked to leave, shortly before being stopped by police. The vehicle was impounded for 30 days, and the driver was prohibited from driving for 90 days. The matter was referred to RoadSafetyBC.

Police had received several similar previous reports in the area, similar in nature over the previous two months. The complainant was able to provide a licence plate, and also surveillance footage, and wished to pursue charges if the truck was located.

Police located the truck with matching plate on 30th St SE about 30 minutes later. The lone occupant and registered owner, a class 7 male driver claimed he had lent his truck out to a friend in the preceding 30 minutes.

Unfortunately for him, his truck started new years day with a fresh start in the impound lot, for 7 days, for stunting. He was also served a \$197 violation ticket for driving without consideration.




