Nevertheless, there are still many fascinating guests who will be gracing the shores of Shuswap Lake come May 16, including **Tracy Cooper-Posey**, who is the author of the popular *Once and Future Hearts* historical fantasy romance series, among many others. She writes romantic suspense, historical, paranormal, fantasy and science fiction romance, plus women's fiction. She also writes under the pen names of Cameron Cooper (science fiction) and Taylen Carver (fantasy). She has published over 200 titles, been nominated for five CAPAs including Favourite Author, is an Aurealis Award Finalist, and has won the Emma Darcy Award.

You could meet **Norma Dunning** (PhD), a Padlei Inuk writer, professor and grandmother. Dr. Dunning completed her doctoral degree in Indigenous Peoples Education at the University of Alberta in 2019. As a professor, Dr. Dunning has written an impressive amount of peer-reviewed content and has been a lead curriculum developer. She's published in poetry, prose, fiction and nonfiction.

Or you could meet Sarah Fox, author of the *USA Today* bestselling Pancake House Mysteries, the Music Lover's Mysteries, Literary Pub Mysteries, True Confections Mysteries, and Magical Menagerie Mysteries. She was born and raised in Vancouver, BC where she developed a love for mysteries at a young age.

You could meet award-winning author and illustrator Royden Lepp. His breakout series, RUST, has been celebrated as "one of the best all-ages stories to be crafted in the past decade." RUST earned multiple honors from the Association of Young Librarians and was optioned for film by 20th Century Fox and Netflix.

FESTIVAL CELEBRATES 25th YEAR

This month marks the 25th year of the Shuswap Music Festival. The journey began at the start of the millenium when Salmon Arm Rotary and BC Registered Music Teachers shared a vision to host a regional festival for young Shuswap musicians.

Thousands of talented musicians have taken to the stage, including choirs, school bands, solo vocalists, pianists and string players.

Performers learn from each other Dyk and from a roster of esteemed professional adjudicators who encourage and inspire excellence.

Some participants have pursued serious careers in music, becoming music teachers, performing in symphony orchestras, achieving international acclaim, and winning prestigious awards. Many have developed a deeper appreciation for music that continues to enrich their lives. They are the ones who join community choirs and participate in local events and orchestras.

A dedicated community of volunteers makes this month long-event happen, including Sue McCrae and Jane Hine who have been with it from the beginning.

The festival is supported by donations and community grants as well as Memorial bequests and family foundations generously

ESCAPE FROM TODAY'S WORLD

Rising star conductor
Joana Mallwitz makes
her Met debut leading
an extraordinary cast in
Mozart's comic masterpiece, Le Nozze di Figaro.
Bass-baritone Michael Sumuel stars as the clever valet

Figaro, opposite soprano Olga Kulchynska as his betrothed, the wily maid Susanna. Baritone Joshua Hopkins is

the skirt-chasing Count, with soprano Federica Lombardi as his anguished wife and mezzo-soprano Marianne Crebassa as adolescent page.

The production is a remarkable marriage of Mozart's music at the height of his genius and what might be the best

libretto ever set. In adapting a play that caused a scandal with its revolutionary take on 18th-century society, librettist Lorenzo Da Ponte focussed more on the timeless issues embedded in this brilliant drawing room comedy.

Its score reflects a tension among the social classes and between the sexes. First impression is one of tremendous elegance - beneath the surface lies a subtext of pain and deception—and ultimate

forgiveness. The women's showpiece arias reflect the depth of the drama with delicate, ravishingly beautiful melodies. At every turn, the orchestra expresses the unspoken thoughts and motivations of the characters

Seville, the setting of Le Nozze di Figaro and its prequel, *The Barber of Seville*, was famous in Mozart's time

as a place filled with hot-blooded young men and exotically beautiful women sequestered behind latticed windows, or "jalousies" (which gave us our English word "jealousy"). The cur-

Salmon Arm Ioses Trans Canada

he highway through Salmon Arm is now redesignated Highway No. 5 as part of Canada's adjustment to the US annexation of Southern Alberta and a honking big part of Saskatchewan.


Former Alberta Premier Danielle Smiss celebrated her 54th birthday on April 1st as the first governor of the new 51st State of Alberchewan.

US President Trump called it a "huge victory for America". He said he was simply "applying his genius art of the deal tactic" after spending his first three months in office demanding that the entire nation of Canada be annexed.

"I call Alberchewan the *Funnel State*. What a beautiful name!" he said referring to the 51st State's funnel shape that will soon funnel a P.O.W.E.R. house of resources directly into the heart of the USA - namely Potash, Oil, Wheat, Electricity and Rocky mountain water from the east flowing Bow River.

Banff National Park will remain part of Canada in exchange for a portion of southwestern Saskatchewan.

Salmon Arm Mayor Harry Allenson expressed disappointment over Canada's great loss of Southern Alberta, as well as the



Shuswap's loss of Trans Canada status. "The rerouting of Highway 1 on the Yellowhead will reduce transport traffic, however, time will tell how it will affect the volume of tourist traffic."

The decision to join the US was on condition of a referendum vote of at least 51 per cent favourable vote in South Alberta up to and including Red Deer.

There are reports of thousands of Canadian loyalist Calgarians trading homes with Pro-annexation Edmontonians.

In praise of solitude

wo evenings ago I was browsing through the menu on my TV and for some reason I stopped on a channel I did not recognize.

It was one of those

channels I rarely stop on. I selected it and watched from the middle to see what was going on.

There were two people, one was a large bearded gentleman draped in an expansive robe and carrying a walking stick. The other was a 40-something woman who seemed on a journey of enlightenment. They were in a quiet wooded area surrounded by nature. The lady, as it turned out, was a very busy executive of some sort who's life was tied to her cell phone and be available 24/7. At the start, she turned off her cell and lap top and all connection to the world around her. The objective seemed to be to get her away from those things that entrapped her and find peace among the simple things.

As I tapped into this episode she had just returned to the company of the gentleman who was sitting on a log awaiting her return. Apparently she had requested 20 minutes of alone time to wander off and find a quiet spot. It seems she had been gone for 40 minutes and upon returning, began to weep. She had never been alone in a wood before and was deeply moved by the experience. She pointed out that growing up she had never gone camping, fishing, never rode a bike and had no attachment or understanding of the natural environment.

After this two-day journey she was given permission to turn on, once again, her devices. She had over 200 messages awaiting her and her lap top no longer recognized her in the "face recognition" mode. So soon we are forgotten.

This short episode inspired me to reflect on what is important and the moments that changed my life. Not because these moments were significant, but that they were special.

I remember the time I took a lady canoeing, visiting from Australia who desperately wanted to see a loon. She was terrified of the canoe but her desire was strong. After an hour we were about to give up when all of a sudden a loon surfaced 20 feet from our boat and gave that iconic cry that we all know so well and says "I am Canadian". I also remember the last time I took my grandson fishing in a small lake up on the Adams Lake plateau. We were making small talk when an osprey circled over head and plunged into the water for a fish a few feet away. Another time my daughter and came upon two deer in the headlights of our truck, We stopped, got out of the truck, I took her hand and we walked up to those two young deer as they stepped closer to us. These moments deny explanation but we never forget.

Faced with so many ugly things these days it is comforting to recall the nice things. Happy Easter folks.

That's changed now. It seems


ment, have a certain seriousness about them. I understand that now as an elected official often summoned to discuss important matters to communities, especially to small ones like ours and those in our region.




