6 IDEAS Ear to the GROUND Back on track

Construction will continue throughout Fall on the rail trail between Sicamous and Armstrong. Work had been focussed north of Sicamous and the southern end of Armstrong this past Summer.

Some sections will be raised up nearly a metre over the next several weeks. The southern section is a one-kilometre pathway next to the active CN/CP railway spur and highway 97A from Lansdowne to Pleasant Valley Road.

Funding for these two project sections is from the BC Active Transportation grant program, with contributions from CSRD and RDNO rail trail reserves, and contributions from the District of Sicamous and CSRD Electoral Area E Economic Opportunities Fund.


The project work will include flood erosion repairs along Mara Lake and the Shuswap River, aggregate surfacing of the trail, pedestrian-friendly modifications to rail bridges, road crossings, signage installation, and improved trailhead access.

Final approvals from the Agricultural Land Commission (ALC) are pending after the rail trail partner owners agreed this spring to offer crossing easements for agricultural landowners who prefer them. Targeted completion date for the 42.6 km section is fall 2025, with a contingency plan extending into 2026.

Chris sat with his mouth agape looking from the movie to Marcus. "No way."


"Yes, way."

■ Data-Driven Decisions: AI can analyze vast amounts of data quickly and provide insights that could help in making informed decisions about city planning, budgeting, resource allocation, and more.

■ Impartiality: AI lacks personal biases and can make decisions based solely on data and facts, potentially leading to fairer and more balanced outcomes.

■ Efficiency: AI can process information and propose solutions faster than humans, making it ideal for handling routine tasks, managing city services, and optimizing operational processes.

■ Public Engagement: AI could assist in enhancing public engagement by analyzing feedback from citizens, identifying trends, and recommending solutions that align with public sentiment.

■ Predictive Analytics: AI can forecast future challenges, such as traffic congestion, crime patterns, or resource shortages, enabling proactive planning and intervention.

CONS

■ Lack of Human Empathy: AI lacks emotional intelligence, empathy, and the ability to understand complex human emotions and social dynamics. This could lead to decisions that are technically sound but lack consideration for human nuances.

■ Accountability Issues: Determining accountability can be challenging if AI makes a mistake or if there is a bias in the data it uses. Who would be held responsible?

■ Limited Understanding of Context: While AI can process data, it may struggle with under-standing cultural, historical, and social contexts that are often crucial in policy-making.

■ Public Trust and Acceptance: Many people may be uncomfortable with an AI making decisions that affect their daily lives, particularly if they feel it lacks transparency or doesn't represent their values.

■ Potential for Bias: AI is only as good as the data it is trained on. If the data is biased, the AI's decisions could inadvertently perpetuate or even exacerbate existing inequalities.

CONCLUSION

■ While AI could assist a human city councilor by providing data-driven insights and improving efficiency, a fully AI city councilor would face significant challenges in areas requiring empathy, ethical judgment, and accountability. A hybrid model, where AI supports human decision-makers, might be the most effective approach.



MAP FLIPS

These two maps paint a very different depiction of North America. The map on the right show pre-European colonization when present-day British Columbia was inhabited for millennia by many First Nations.

The map on the left shows colonial North America in 1830. Notice the land of British Columbia was not part of British North America.

The territory was in limbo prior to the resolution of the Oregon boundary dispute between the US and UK in 1846.

That is when the colonies of Vancouver Island and British Columbia were established; the former in 1849 and the latter in 1858. The two colonies were merged to form a single colony in 1866, which later joined the Canadian Confederation on July 20, 1871.

Also notice how much of Mexico occupied the present day US.
