ELECTION FRENZY!

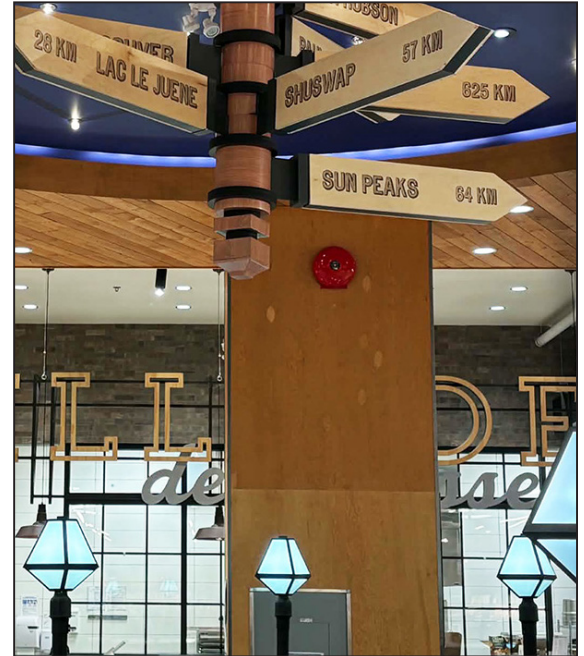
There are now two simultaneous election campaigns happening in the province. The snap BC election Oct. 24, a week after the municipal vote, is now busy playing catch up.

The BC Conservative Party that became leaderless last week after several defections and a merging new party now appears to be reassembling to create a centre-right coalition.

Greg McCune who ran as an Independent in 2024 after BC United folded and now running for Enderby council, said there's a meeting Thursday (today), but "there may not be time for anyone to challenge (MLA David Williams). "Keep your seatbelt buckled up," he quipped.

Kamloops Symphony is opening its 50th anniversary season with a special concert featuring JUNO award winning composer and Inuk soprano Deantha Edmunds.

Salmon Arm is privileged to experience this concert titled "Inspired by Here" as the first of this season's three "Salmon Arm Sundays" series, 3 pm, Sept. 27 at Nexus at First.

Edmunds' debut with the KSO will be followed by *Sibelius Symphony No. 1*, a work that moves from brooding and restless to genuinely triumphant.

In 2025 Deantha Edmunds was the first indigenous person to win the JUNO Award for Classical Composition of the Year. The KSO will perform her award-winning song cycle alongside others of her works.

BC-born, and rising young conductor,



Karl Hirzer will lead the orchestra for this celebration concert. His musical path has taken him to major stages in Europe and back to conduct this concert.

This past summer he performed at one of the most storied events in classical music, at the Bayreuth Festival in Germany, the festival Wagner created, and the theatre he built, for his own operas in 1876.

Low speed bicycle chase continues on foot

A 46-year-old male escaped on his bicycle when police attempted to arrest him at Ross Plaza for outstanding warrants.

After RCMP caught up with him and knocked him off his bike, the suspect ran down an alleyway for about 200 metres until he was intercepted by another officer. The suspect was charged with resisting arrest as well as related to his arrest warrant.

A stop for not wearing a helmet while riding an electric scooter led to drug related charges against a 74-year-old man.

Police previously observed the scooter senior making numerous short stops at known problem residences. While opening his man-purse to show his ID, police noticed a large sum of cash, and on further search, a digital scale, silver spoon and nearly 40 grams of suspected cocaine. The man was issued a violation ticket for no helmet with charge recommendations forthcoming to BC Prosecution.

A man reported being locked out of his house by his ex-girlfriend who was inside smashing items and throwing chairs out of the second floor deck. Once police arrived

around midnight August 31, the man showed a video of the 22-year-old slashing the man's tires with a kitchen knife and smashing the windshield. The woman was released the next morning, once sober, on conditions, and with a future court date for multiple charges.

A black Chevrolet Silverado that was impounded after 49-year-old woman blew a "fail" was later matched to a truck reported stolen from Malakwa. The owner of the truck claimed the woman was unknown to him. RCMP are forwarding charges for approval against the woman for possession of property obtained by crime.

A suspect caught on video stealing pepperoni from a store on Hudson was located near the hospital with the pepperoni in her possession. The complainant claimed the female has stolen multiple times from the store and was now wanting charges.

Sorry, "Open House" organizers, but it is simply not the same.

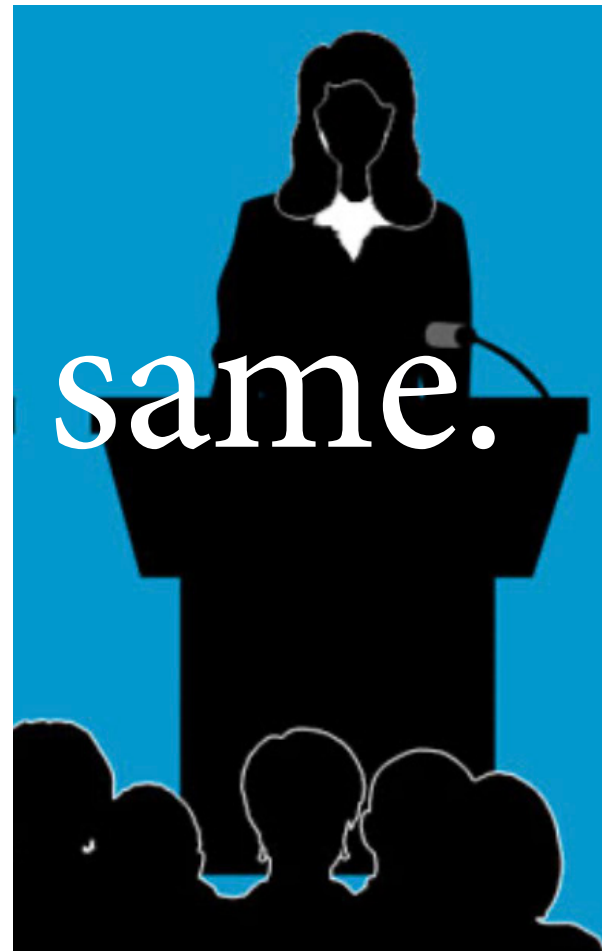
The traditional All Candidates forum definitely has its flaws, but, at the end of the day, the public gets to hear all of the candidates (there are many) present themselves and their positions, and display their abilities to think on their feet and defend their views, priorities and what they would like to do if elected.

Often it can be superficial, but it has generally been an effective way for voters to interview candidates for the job.

Going from table-to-table

and engaging in one-on-one interactions with which ever candidate is free to talk to or eludes some appeal does not strike me as effective.

It is not too late to, at least, add brief introductions from each candidate. How about for the first hour and a bit, the candidates get up to the podium and each give a three minute pitch (perhaps a separate forum for the four school district candidates). Then for the second half, the public can take their questions to the tables set up. Maybe consider that as a compromise to the Open House format.

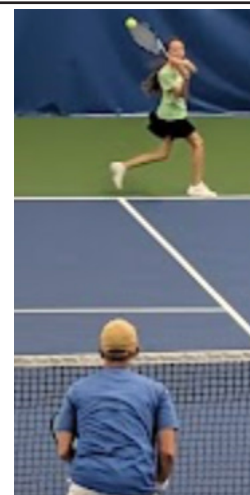

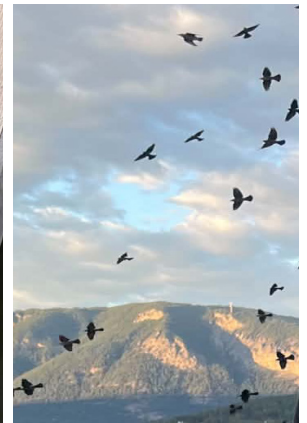
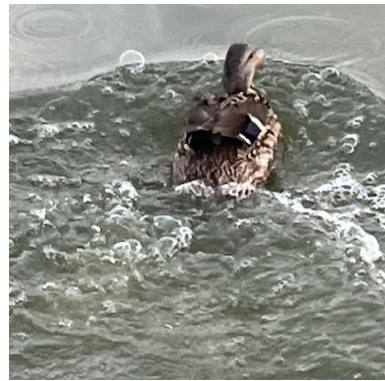
