Former RCMP Commissioner and Senator began her career in Salmon Arm and retired here

Bev Busson made history in 1974 when she was among the first group of female officers. Salmon Arm was her first posting. She told the gathering at the Veterans dinner that she gained a lot of street cred on her second day when she was sent off to pick up the mail and returned with an intoxicated man she picked up from the middle of Hudson.

In the years before retiring back to the Shuswap, she reached the pinnacle as RCMP commissioner in 2006, a Senate seat in 2018 and the Order of Canada, plus other major positions in between. ■

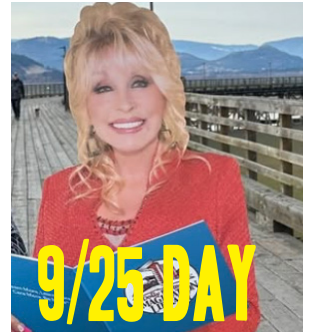

ELECTION FRENZY!

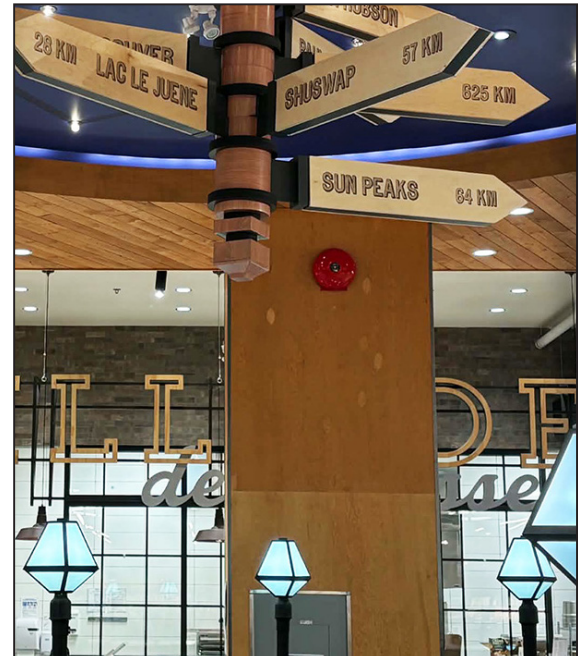
There are now two simultaneous election campaigns happening in the province. The snap BC election Oct. 24, a week after the municipal vote, is now busy playing catch up.

The BC Conservative Party that became leaderless last week after several defections and a merging new party now appears to be reassembling to create a centre-right coalition.

Greg McCune who ran as an Independent in 2024 after BC United folded and now running for Enderby council, said there's a meeting Thursday (today), but "there may not be time for anyone to challenge (MLA David Williams). "Keep your seatbelt buckled up," he quipped.

Low speed bicycle chase continues on foot

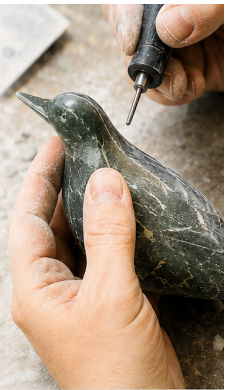

Sorry, "Open House" organizers, but it is simply not the same.

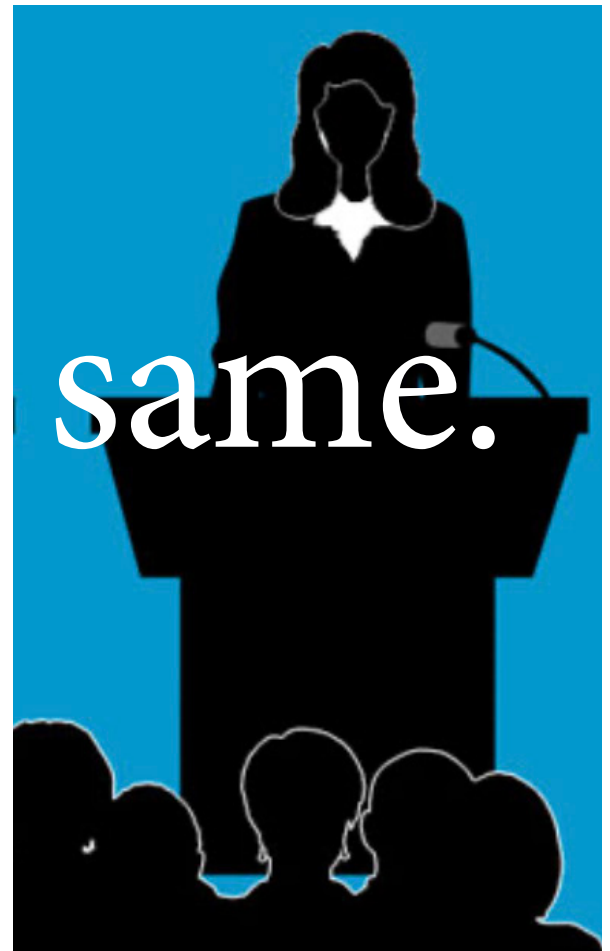
The traditional All Candidates forum definitely has its flaws, but, at the end of the day, the public gets to hear all of the candidates (there are many) present themselves and their positions, and display their abilities to think on their feet and defend their views, priorities and what they would like to do if elected.

Often it can be superficial, but it has generally been an effective way for voters to interview candidates for the job.

Going from table-to-table

and engaging in one-on-one interactions with which ever candidate is free to talk to or eludes some appeal does not strike me as effective.

It is not too late to, at least, add brief introductions from each candidate. How about for the first hour and a bit, the candidates get up to the podium and each give a three minute pitch (perhaps a separate forum for the four school district candidates). Then for the second half, the public can take their questions to the tables set up. Maybe consider that as a compromise to the Open House format.
